The 2021-22 academic year has been an outstanding year of improvement for our Trust. Our commitment to progress is reflected in this year's Ofsted outcomes.

Over six inspections this year, we've received five Good judgements! This is fantastic news for each of the visited academies, as it demonstrates the hard work carried out by so many of our colleagues to ensure each of our learners receives the very best educational experiences.

We're especially pleased for Pool Hayes Academy, who, with the support of our Trust, received their first Good judgement in the school's fifty-nine year history! Special congratulations must also go to Sutton Community Academy. SCA's hard-working colleagues have managed the impressive feat of jumping two Ofsted grades with new leadership in the middle of the pandemic.

We're eagerly awaiting the publication of TQEA's most recent report, but we're confident it will mirror the other successes across our Trust this year.



Amazing Accolades

The incredible hard work of our colleagues and our academies continues to be recognised in the amazing accolades with which they have been presented this term.

In fantastic news from ATT Further Education College, Principal Liz Barrett was awarded an OBE by the Prince of Wales at Windsor Castle on 8 June 2022 ,for services to education. The honour recognises Liz's ongoing dedication to lifelong learning at all levels, including the establishment and leadership of ATTFE. Under her direction, the college offers educational opportunities to local people whilst offering support through unique charity and community initiatives. The communities that ATTFE College serve benefit significantly from the educational input, leadership, community focus, time, energy, vision and care that Liz devotes to them.

Other accreditations awarded across our Trust this term include the Bronze Unicef Rights Respecting Schools Award, attributed to TQEA in recognition of their advoacation to create safe and inspiring places to learn, where children are respected, their talents are nurtured and they are able to thrive. According to Unicef, commitment to these values allows children "the best chance to lead happy, healthy lives and to be responsible, active citizens".

Another prestigious accolade was awarded to Star Academy, who received the Primary Science Quality Mark. This is awarded to schools who demonstrate expertise in science leadership, teaching, and learning, and is supported by specialised, high-quality training. Well done to all those involved!



We're pleased to announce that our Trust has appointed a new CEO to take over from Interim Chief Executive Richard Elms at the start of November 2022.

Nationally recognised education leadership specialist Sir Nick Weller will be joining us from Dixons Academies Trust, a West Yorkshire MAT that has flourished under his leadership over the past 16 years. Sir Nick led Dixons on a journey from a single school in Bradford to a family of fifteen high-performing schools across the North of England.

Pat Beanland, the our Chair of Trustees, said: "Sir Nick comes to us with a national reputation. He has been instrumental in leading Dixons to become one of the most respected multi-academy trusts in the country.

"We look forward to welcoming him and working with him as we continue to focus on transforming the lives of the children and young people we are privileged to serve."

Sir Nick told TES: "It has been a great privilege leading Dixons for the last 16 years. In this time we have grown from one single academy to 15 schools across four cities. I am incredibly proud of everything that we have achieved together in our unwavering commitment to challenging educational and social disadvantage in the North.

"Academy Transformation Trust is a larger, strongly improving trust facing the challenges of a wider geographical spread. I am really looking forward to joining in November, and to working with the academies and the central team to build an even better future for ATT's students and pupils."

As he joins us at a time of great improvement and progress across our Trust, we are sure that Sir Nick's vast experience will help guide our work to transform lives by putting education first.



Jubilee Celebrations

This year marked the Queen's Platinum Jubilee; for academies across our Trust, this was an occasion to celebrate our monarch but also to engage in learning about our country and its history. Pupils in all our academies learn about *British Values*- such as liberty, respect and tolerance- but this was an opportunity for our learners to explore some of our more light-hearted traditions- such as jam and scones!

In partnership with the Swaffham Lions, TNHA welcomed guests from their community to a traditional afternoon tea, served by hospitality students. This was an opportunity to share stories with those who experienced the Queen's Coronation, through to her Platinum Jubilee seventy years later. Along with the TNHA *Right Royal Quiz*, guests were treated to a game of Jubilee Bingo organised by the Lions. The eldest guest was Elsie, who at **102 years** young had some wonderful memories to share!

As Great Heath celebrated in the sun with a Jubilee picnic, they sang the National Anthem and were even treated to a performance by their Year Six brass ensemble. Pupils were also honoured to be asked to sing at the Jubilee Beacon lighting in Mildenhall. They were a credit to the academy as they led the singing of the National Anthem.

Pupils at Caldmore Primary Academy enjoyed another Great British tradition- afternoon tea, complete with sandwiches and cakes! They also tried out some crafts, constructing a miniature Queen's Guard from toilet roll tubes.



ATTFE went above and beyond, joining forces with local businesses and services to deliver a community cream tea event, with fun-filled activities and jam-filled scones!

10,000 local primary school, secondary school, college, stakeholders, partners, day centre and care home residents participated in this community record each receiving a cream scone, jam, cream, flag, crown and activity book. Onn Thursday 26 May, everyone enjoyed *cream tea for Jubilee with ATTFE*, celebrating being able to share time together after the difficulty of pandemic restrictions.

It was a magnificent occasion with lots of smiles, red, white and blue, and debate over jam or cream first!





Diving Deep

Earlier this year, students at Iceni Secondary Academy entered the 'Dive Project Cornwall' competition, a contest to enable students at winning schools to learn to dive and achieve their PADI Open Water Diver certification, learn about the colourful and diverse marine and coastal environments of Cornwall and participate as part of the analysis team for a citizen science project. The competition sought 20 winning schools, one for each region of the UK — and so competition was fierce.

Having progressed to the second round of the competition, Iceni Secondary Academy students designed and made a marine creature using single use plastics, created and filmed a two-minute video on why they wanted to win the competition and, finally, collectively wrote an essay exploring the importance of protecting our oceans. 15 students from across Years 7, 8 and 9 participated in these activities, working collaboratively on the entry for Iceni Academy.

Iceni Secondary Academy students were thrilled to learn they had won the competition. A group of twenty students will be representing the eastern region in Pothkerris, Cornwall, in May 2023. As part of the project, students will also be able to complete a 'Try dive' at Cristal Seas SCUBA in Norwich.

The competition brief instructed the children to create a news report, lasting 80-90 seconds, on the topic of climate change.

Kingsmoor Academy is delighted to announce that their entry came first nationally! A massive congratulations to the children who won: Dayo O, Isobel P, Zack C, and Mason S.

Their news report focused on the importance of recycling. The judges at Sky said the report featured "really strong submissions. Great use of graphics, titles, and pictures to support the story. Nice to see pictures from the school edited into the feature and use of stats to help the key facts land."

The children will soon get to experience a day out at the Sky Studios and their news report will be played on a Sky Platform! Everyone at Kingsmoor Academy is very proud of them.



Uni Life

As part of the Year 10 Scholars Programme supported by *Take Your Place*, some of our Year 10 students visited Cambridge University Library for a Charles Darwin workshop. It was fascinating to see some of the original artefacts and to engage in some work around using contemporary sources to find out about the reaction to Darwin's ideas in the Victorian period. In the afternoon we were lucky enough to have lunch at St Catharine's College and we were given a guided tour around the facilities by some current students. It was great to hear their experiences of Cambridge University and for our students to ask questions about the application process and university life.

In Sport

SCA's new cricket team were pleased to win their first match this term after months of hard training. Students also represented the academy at the *Go for Gold* run, with all students achieving their bands for completing 3, 5 or 10km!

Dukeries were delighted to hear that Sam H (Y7) and Oli M (Y10) have both been retained by Mansfield Town's Academy for next year after another successful season, with both boys impressing all with their extraordinary skills honed alongside their studies. High-flying Daisie H (Y10) has had quite the sporting year; through competing for Lincoln Imps and representing East Midlands U17s as their current champion, she has earned enough ranking and competition points to qualify for the National Finals! Giving Back at Westbourne

Westbourne Academy has shown an incredible spirit of giving over a year of financial hardship for many UK families. Here's a look at what they've been up to:

September- the return of the traditional House cake sale saw £574 raised for MacMillan, and 1000 freshly baked donuts were consumed in 20 minutes (with thanks to Community Champions at the local Morrisons store)

December- £372.76 was raised on Christmas Jumper Day for Save the Children. National Number Day on 2 February raised £370 in aid of the NSPCC, thanks to the maths team.

February- news coverage of the war in Ukraine encouraged the academy to show their support. Assistant Principal Andy Smith orchestrated a bake sale, a blue/yellow civvies day and a very popular raffle. The decorated Environment-owl is now one of 50 on display in the town as part of The Big Hoot Art trail over the summer break.



We all know that physical activity is good for our health, whatever our age. TNHA's PE department led a Physical Activity Week to help promote this important message. Running from 20 to 24 June, the event started with our two-day Sports Day.

On the Wednesday all students and staff engaged in an academy wide *Sit Less and Move More* campaign. All usual lessons incorporated an activity, such as maths escape rooms in Maths, *Play in a Day* and Mad Hatters tea party in English, salsa dancing, marching band practice, and practical science demonstrations.

The final two days saw students involved in a range of activities on and off site, which included outdoor assault courses, walks at Sandringham and Whitlingham, bowling, dodgeball, huggling and watersports.







17 year 10 students from MCA enjoyed the warm weather during bronze their Duke of Edinburgh expedition, walking just under 13 miles across varying terrains from Culford to Thorpe Woodlands.
