With community coffee mornings and a reading club on the roster, ATT FE are providing something for everyone. 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A key part of our Trust's vision is to ensure that all our learners are prepared for the future, wherever this may take them. To make sure this happens, we aim to deliver the very best careers education in our academies.

Bristnall Hall Academy has most recently received the Quality in Careers Standard, the national quality award for careers education, information, advice and guidance (CEIAG) in secondary schools, colleges. With careers talks and activities from the Royal Navy; Sandwell and West Birmingham NHS Trust; The Crown Prosecution Service; British Red Cross; Wates Construction Company and more, BHA's careers offer this term has been truly astounding! Sutton Community Academy, another academy bearing the Quality in Careers Standards, hosted an on-site careers fayre for KS4 and 5 students this term. This annual event, attended by a plethora of local and national employers and education providers, helps students to rec-ognize the huge range of options available to them in the future. It also gives them the oppor-tunity to speak to experts in all sorts of fields, ask questions, and establish goals. At BHA, Year 11 students have attended a careers and next steps fayre at the West Bromwich Albion football ground.

Our Trust is incredibly proud to be a member of the Armed Forces Covenant, and we strive to be a supportive employer of armed forces veterans and reservists. Because of this, we're happy to see academies fostering strong links with armed and emergency forces in their communities. Visiting talks from these organisations help keep our students informed of further career paths available to them. This term, PHA students have listened to a careers talk from West Midlands Police on the various routes into policing, and BHA students have enjoyed interactive STEM Career sessions with the Royal Navy. In many of our academies, students are already involved with local community branches of the armed forces; we're always happy to celebrate the successes of our cadets!

Another important aspect of CEIAG is offering guidance on higher education. Around this time, we are offering the best of luck to students across our Post-16 provision who are submitting UCAS applications! Our academies offer fantastic support to students thinking about studying at university. This term, Year 12 and 13 students from the Dukeries Academy have visited Durham University for a campus tour, getting to know the uni experience in more detail.

Enrichment is integral to a broad and balanced curriculum, providing learning beyond the normal classroom setting. We're proud to showcase the incredible range of extracurricular activities offered by our academies, helping to ensure that all pupils across our trust experience strong personal, spiritual and emotional development in addition to the academic. Educational trips and visits are a fun and engaging way to help pupils apply their learning in real life situations.

The Queen Elizabeth Academy provided geography students with a truly once-in-a-lifetime trip this term, visiting Iceland for a whistlestop tour of it's unique geographic features. Students got up close with amazing waterfalls and basalt columns, lava flows and sulphuric mud puddles- they even witnessed the northern lights! Elsewhere, The Dukeries Academy has taken business students on a visit to Cadbury world, explor-ing their museum to learn about business and marketing from a successful UK brand. Jubilee Academy's Year 2 visited Warwick Castle as a fabulous finish to their unit on monarchs and royalty. NWPA's Reception had the greatest day at Statfold Narrow Gauge museum, especially loving the train and tram ride.

Interesting talks and visits this term have included GB Paralympian and Commonwealth Ambassador Siobhan Fitzpatrick speaking at Bristnall Hall Academy, as part of Birmingham's 2022 Commonwealth Games; Ravens Academy visited by a the-atre company to share an important message about air pollution, helping them engage with their learning about conservation; Caldmore Primary Academy's Nursery being visited by the Farm on Wheels, linking to their topic *Do Cows Drink Milk?*; Suffolk Police speaking to Great Heath pupils about crime and bullying. Phoenix Academy were delighted to welcome Pep The Poet whose mission is to "scatter sunshine one poem at a time". The children thoroughly enjoyed spending time with him, listening to his poetry and then having a go at writing their own.

We want all our learners to be ambitious and resilient- our goal as a Trust is to help each of them reach their full potential. With that in mind, we're keen to recognise where students have gone above and beyond to achieve! Some of our learners this term should be commended for their performance in competions and challenges, both external and organised by academies.

Last year at BHA, students entered the Queen's Commonwealth Essay Writing Competition, where they produced written pieces based on the theme 'Our Commonwealth'. The Queen's Commonwealth Essay Competition is the world's oldest international schools' writing contest, established by the Society in 1883. With thousands of young people taking part each year, it is an important wat to recognise achievement, elevate youth voices and develop key skills through creative writing. Out of the 26,322 entries, a number of BHA students received commendations and awards, and Principal Louisa Pritchard was invited to Buckingham Palace to represent the academy and celebrate everyone who entered.

Siam from Caldmore Primary Academy won a competition to name a West Midlands Police drone this term. The Drone Police are currently being filmed for Channel Four program *Sky Cops,* and two Police Drone Police Officers arrived to the school accompanied by camera crew to show the pupils how the drones are used to prevent and stop crime. Theu were shown how thermal imaging was used and they all had the opportunity to ask questions. Siam was presented with a framed image of his design, a police hat, teddy and a family ticket to the Police museum. The pupils then got to watch Siam's drone 'Little Timmy' fly and look at the footage it had captured.
