We're kicking off this term's edition with an interview with our CEO, Sir Nick Weller, who has been with ATT since November 2022.

Get to Know

What attracted you to join ATT after such a long time with Dixons?

I was looking for a new experience and personally, I needed a new challenge. ATT is a Trust with a lot of potential that has had some very strong Ofsted judgements recently. I know it's been through some difficult times in the past, but I think we are through those now. Building on that and building a more positive culture across the organisation was really appealing to me.

You've been with ATT for about six months now. What do you feel you've achieved in that time?

I think we now have a clear sense of direction going forward. We've done significant restructuring around the central team, we've boosted up safeguarding and SEND for next year. All Trusts are facing financial challenges, so putting ATT on secure financial footing has been a key priority for me in recent months.

What are your ambitions for the Trust moving forward?

There are four goals we are working towards. The first thing we want to do is build a greater commonality in terms of what binds us together as ATT, including things like culture and learning.

We've made a start on restructuring our vital shared services, to make them as cost effective and impactful as possible.

We are working to improve outcomes, which is particularly challenging at the moment, with national attendance figures being what they are.

We're also starting to approach the idea of taking on new schools, and I think an element of growth over the next few years would be a very positive thing. Whereas in the past ATT wasn't the first port of call when a school became available for sponsorship, those perceptions are changing, and we are starting to be approached.

Let's talk a little bit about your background. What have you been most proud of over your long education career?

I started my career as an English teacher in London. It was a fairly turbulent time in the early eighties, and I ve always worked in challenging schools and environments with high levels of disadvantage. I've always been proud of opening up opportunities for students that they otherwise wouldn't have had. Over sixteen years at Dixons, I worked with some very challenging schools in a much more urban environment. I'm proud of the schools we started from scratch, and which absolutely transformed learning in those communities, but also those which we were brave enough to take on and turned around. This is the ethos I want to bring to ATT, whose rural communities are probably even more marginalised and forgotten than those urban communities I have previously worked with; they re not front-and-centre of political consciousness.

Describe our Trust in one word? I'd say high-potential.

What would you have done if you'd not decided to work in education?

I think I would have been a barrister.

What are you currently reading?

Scrum Master, by Joe Justice.

What's your favourite food or restaurant?

I love a place called Dishoo- it's an Indian, modern fusion kind of place.

What's your ideal holiday destination?

My favourite place to visit is Portugal.

What's on your bucket list?

I'd love to do a trip down the Amazon. I'd like to say a parachute jump, but I don't know that I'd be brave enough to do it!

What are your hobbies?

I dabble in DIY and carpentry, like building bookshelves.

What's the best piece of advice you've received in your career?

That we do it for the pupils, not for Ofsted.

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Looking to the Future

A transformational education sets students up for life, opening up career paths and opportunities for the future. This term, our secondary academies have been supporting students in planning for the future with comprehensive careers events.

Bristnall Hall Academy had a hectic and exciting National Careers Week, with activities including a visit from Steve Clamp to discuss careers in the media, organised and filmed by ITV; a careers fair for KS3 students and parents, with local education and employment providers answering questions; virtual venets from Birmingham Metropolitan College and Success for Schools. At ATTFE, learners have been refining their practical careers skills through mock interviews, with volunteer interviewers including local business owners, emergency services, and council representatives.

Across our academies, enrichment activities promote engagement in the growing field of STEM. TNHA and BHA have both attended workshops with the UK miltary this term to learn about STEM careers in the armed forces. At Kingsmoor, Year 3 have been engaging in STEM workshops with industry experts, learning about scientific skills and having their learning brought to life!

Westbourne Academy's brand-new community hub opened its doors in December, created to make better use of an empty space after school at a time when local residents were facing growing financial pressures. Now, the hub is a place of warmth and comfort that provides professional guidance on matters from money management to childcare, and distributes donations of food and other essesntials to those in need.

The Westbourne Community Hub is also offering another innovative service, the brainchild of TA Opal Degville. Opal created a Pre-loved Prom Pop Up Shop, receiving an amazing 200 donations of formalwear items from the community. She wants to help to remove the cost barrier of fancy prom outfits and ensure every child has the opportunity to celebrate the end of secondary school like the rest of their peers.
