Oh, What a Night!

ATT's Cross-Academy Gala Concert at the Apex

Two years in the planning, 250 students with ages ranging from 5-18 from across 5 Trust Academies, performing in our first ever 'ATT Gala Concert' at The Apex in Bury St Edmunds in a glorious celebration of our ATT Music family.

We heralded our unique musical identities with samba, rock, steel pans, 'Matilda', vocal ensembles, piano solos and chamber groups. The highlight was the collaborative 'Big Sing' bringing all of the students together as one huge ATT musical ensemble.



Of course the event didn't just involve the performance day. Workshops with MCA ex-student and professional singer Steven Yallop took place across the schools engaging a large number of the participating students. These engaging high-energy sessions focused on teamwork, vocal skills and performing. The students were also treated to a live performance opportunity with Steven giving a recital at each academy followed by a Q and A session. The Faculty leader for Music at MCA visited all of the academies to give vocal workshops and to teach the five collaborative songs. Soloists from each academy were chosen and had further online sessions to prepare them. Instrumentalists from each school were also selected to form the 'band' for some of the joint songs and rehearsals took place with their own music teachers and using specially made backing tracks to for their parts too. The impact of these visits was huge and very evident in the confident delivery and engagement of all of the performers in the final concert.



Two compositions were created and performed as part of the project - 'Summer Storm' (Iceni) was developed through improvisation using percussion and vocal sounds to create a soundscape. 'Junk Samba' (Nicholas Hammond) was produced using samba instruments borrowed from Norfolk Music Hub and then various items of 'junk' with focus on developing syncopation, polyrhythm and structure.



At the actual performance former MCA student and singer – songwriter Kieran Davis performed one of his original songs and was present to offer feedback and advice to the students during the day. The actual concert comprised individual performances from each of the schools celebrating their unique specialisms and then the 5 joint performances of 'Believe' (Lin Marsh), 'This is Me', 'Stand By Me', 'Fix You' and the finale 'Sunchyme' with steel pans.





The whole project was musically very satisfying, introducing our ATT students to a range of different genres / instruments, expanding their horizons in terms of careers in music, building individual and ensemble musical skills, building self-esteem and instilling a desire to aim higher. It was a wonderful, memorable and inclusive experience for all and a brilliant example of how music can transform lives and reach us all. We felt a wonderful sense of togetherness and felt incredibly proud to be part of the ATT musical family. The links made between the schools are now firmly established and plans are made to continue to collaborate and share expertise so that our future ATT cohorts continue to feel the impact of this amazing project.

This year our Y4 children have participated in a Wilder Schools' project with Suffolk Wildlife Trust. This started with an audit of our school grounds to see what wildlife they could find. They then considered how to increase the amount of wildlife that live on our grounds. The children researched different ideas and planned the project. They shared the project with the school in assemblies and organised a pyjama day to raise money. They also wrote to local businesses and our PTA to ask for donations.

On Saturday 8 July, we held a community day where over 140 people came to help develop the outside area! This included constructing our bog garden, creating a hedgehog hill, planting flower borders, creating a vegetable patch, building bug hotels, creating tepees to sit in, and digging out a sunflower and wild flower maze. We have also created an outdoor learning area. The whole school is now involved in the rota for watering and we are looking forward to the learning we will be able to do!

There were lessons on how and why things were seen, how to give enemy locations, judging distances and moving with and without the weapon, which involved some crawling on their belt buckles in the grass and mud!

The Year 10 cadets did an extended navigation exercise — using their compass and maps to navigate a course with the Year 11s to repeat the same course... but at night!

As the night drew in, the cadets saw how different noises can appear at night time — the still air allowing noises to travel easily and far, even if it was at one point a quite awful choice of music. Iceni Academy Methwold with Dive Project Cornwall

Way back in January 2022, we entered a competition to win a scuba diving trip to Cornwall for 20 students to achieve a PADI scuba diving award. As one of 400 schools who entered, never did we imagine that we would be lucky enough to win, but tried to educate our students about the ocean along the way. Our entry was based around single use plastic alongside a video about the Norfolk coastline and how it differs from that in

other parts of the UK.

As many students as possible experienced a Try Dive at Crystal Seas in Norwich. Over the next few months, around 80 of our students took part, and those selected for the trip got some practice in before leaving for Cornwall. This involved gaining an understanding of the kit, how to set it up safely as well as being able to experience a scuba diving session.







As a school, we wanted to raise as much money as possible for Dive Project Cornwall. Without fundraising, these types of opportunities from non-profit organisations can't continue. In total we raised £1600 through bake sales, a non-uniform day, and individual sponsorship, which is a fantastic amount. Dive Project Cornwall were very grateful for our contribution.

On the 21 May, 16 students and 4 staff made the long 11-hour journey down to Porthkerris, Cornwall. When we arrived at basecamp, the view made it all worth it.







Preparing for the week ahead, students practised scuba diving skill work in the pool before venturing into the sea. Students learnt how to equalize so the pressure in their head didn't cause pain, how to empty their mask whilst under the water (a skill even the instructors find difficult) and how to share oxygen, should a fellow diver ever get into difficulty. Alongside this was some important learning about the ocean, marine life and how we all have a part to play in protecting it.

When not in the water, students were taking part in some valuable educational work to which they would all eventually become 'Ocean Influencers' and take on the role of educating others. Walking down a coastal path to a tiny cove called Porthallow, the clear blue sea was quite a surprise. Here students undertook some rock pooling, exploring, and learning about the marine life, tide cycles, and the ever changing ecosystems. Students were able to touch and hold marine life they had never seen before. Alongside rock pooling there was also an opportunity for a stone skimming competition. I believe Leon currently holds the record of 8 skips of a stone into the water.

A scientist from the Marine Conservation Society taught our students about some of the science behind what is happening in our waters. We went on a beach clean, tested safety levels of the water and used microscopes to look at plankton to name just a few things this session covered. Again, this was noted as a highlight for some students, demonstrating the true educational aspect of this project.







The final full day was all about scuba diving, snorkelling This gave students the opportunity to see the marine life they had been learning about in the ocean. Students saw fish, crabs, sea urchins and star fish to name a few. Lunch on this day was a Cornish Pasty delivered to the beach...a tradition and not one for our students to miss. In the evening, students presented the projects that they had all been working on, focusing on the key messages and learning that had taken place during the week- and all in front of the most beautiful sunset.



After we returned to school, I asked the students what they had enjoyed and what they had learnt. It's fantastic to see that what was originally trip about scuba diving became so much more for our students. The words 'special' and 'emotional' were used regularly throughout the week, and it really was! Watching our students grow, develop, learn, work as organisation team, improve their skills. demonstrate resilience and determination is something that we as staff will always be prod of our students for. Well done to all involved and thank you to the staff and Ethan Flack for giving up their time to make this happen.

Get to Know

What attracted you to join ATT after such a long time with Dixons?

I was looking for a new experience and personally, I just needed a new challenge. ATT is a Trust with a lot of potential that has had some very strong Ofsted judgements recently. I know it's been through some difficult times in the past, but I think we are through those now. Building on that and building a more positive culture across the organisation was really appealing to me.

You've been with ATT for about nine months now. What do you feel you've achieved in that time?

I think we now have a clear sense of direction going forward. We've done significant restructuring around the central team, we've boosted up safeguarding and SEND for next year. All Trusts are facing financial challenges, so putting ATT on secure financial footing has been a key priority for me in recent months.

What are your ambitions for the Trust moving forward?

There are four goals we are working towards. The first thing we want to do is build a greater commonality in terms of what binds us together as ATT, including things like culture and learning.

We've made a start on restructuring our vital shared services, to make them as cost effective and impactful as possible.

We are working to improve outcomes, which is particularly challenging at the moment, with attendance figures being what they are nationally.

We're also starting to approach the idea of taking on new schools, and I think an element of growth over the next few years would be a very positive thing. Whereas in the past ATT wasn't the first port of call when a school became available for sponsorship, those perceptions are changing, and we are starting to be approached.

Let's talk a little bit about your background. What have you been most proud of over your long education career?

I started my career as an English teacher in London. It was a fairly turbulent time in the early eighties, and I've always worked in challenging schools and environments with high levels of disadvantage. I've always been proud of opening up opportunities for students that they otherwise wouldn't have had. Over sixteen years at Dixons, I worked with some very challenging schools in a much more urban environment. I'm proud of the schools we started from scratch, and which absolutely transformed learning in those communities, but also those which we were brave enough to take on and turned around. This is the ethos I want to bring to ATT, whose rural communities are probably even more marginalised and forgotten than those urban communities I have previously worked with; they're not front-and-centre of political consciousness.

I'd say high-potential.

What would you have done if you'd not decided to work in education?

I think I would have been a barrister.

What are you currently reading?

Scrum Master, by Joe Justice.

What's your favourite food or restaurant?

I love a place called Dishoom- it's an Indian, modern fusion kind of place.

What's your ideal holiday destination?

My favourite place to visit is Portugal.

What's on your bucket list?

I'd love to do a trip down the Amazon. I'd like to say a parachute jump, but I don't know that I'd be brave enough to do it!

I dabble in DIY and carpentry, like building bookshelves.

What's the best piece of advice you've received in your career?

That we do it for the pupils, not for Ofsted.
